#### Summarised Finance Report for the period ended 28 February 2018

A table provided an overview of the Polytechnic/s 2018 financial performance to date and compared this against the budget with variances.

Key points:

- Net operating deficit of \$2,531k unfavourable to budget by \$4,374k. The majority of this deficit was due to changes in revenue recognition.
- Capex higher than budget to date by a net \$4,125k, with major project works plus computer equipment ahead of budget timing.
- Net monetary assets \$8m higher than budget
- EFTS enrolments at 4,409 exceeding YTD budget of 3,978

#### **Key Points:**

• The net operating deficit of \$1,039k is unfavourable to budget by \$1,928k. The majority of this deficit is due to changes in revenue recognition. Previously student fees and government funding revenue was spread over the period from the time the student enrolled

until the end of the year, with adjustments made for different financial years only. This was regardless of the dates that the student was actually studying. We have changed the actuals for 2018 to spread the revenue over the dates of the course delivery.

- Capex is higher than budget to date by a net \$4,299k with the major project works (Student Village & Central Accommodation) plus Computer Equipment ahead of the budget timing.
- Net monetary assets are \$8m higher than budget with continued strong cash inflows mainly from student fee revenue combined with lower outflows and conversion of other working capital items to cash.
- EFTS enrolments at 4,674 exceed the YTD budget of 4,169 with continued strong international enrolments as well as second semester domestic enrolments happening earlier than budgeted.

#### **MEDIA COVERAGE**

The number of media articles has been steady this month, with almost 60 articles across print, broadcast and digital news media between March 30-April 26.

#### Highlights:

- **iD Fashion:** the build-up to the week-long event has garnered plenty of interest from local and national media. Dr Margot Barton, Otago Polytechnic Head of Fashion Design, featured in a North and South magazine profile; alumni Darlene Gore and Fiona Clements were the focus of a large ODT feature; and several large articles (ODT and Star) have covered a range of iD-related angles, all of which have been accompanied by vibrant photography.
- **Te Pā Tauira Otago Polytechnic Student Village**: An 1800-word piece describing the design and construction process of Te Pā Tauira was published in NZ Construction News magazine. The feature has also had strong expressions of interest from other media, including the ODT and architecture/building magazine Trenz.
- Sector restructuring proposals: Chief Executive Phil Ker again responded promptly to media requests for comment re Education Minister Chris Hipkin's "ITP Roadmap 2010". Phil's media presence continues to balance a sense of stability (based on Otago Polytechnic's performance), while also being open to changes, including to sector funding model.
- Holly Robinson: Otago Polytechnic graduate Holly Robinson's silver medal at the Commonwealth Games was a focus of both local and national media reports.
