

It has been used as a way of exploring and developing effective action in complex contexts,[3] enabling systems change."




Map the Systems competition

Map the System is a global learning programme and social innovation competition that equips students to use systems thinking to tackle social and environmental challenges.


Examples: NZ fresh produce inflation






Examples: Sand-mining

Observations - Teaching team

Not a project for heropreneurs


Ultimately students need to build relationship to effectively to be effective
